Description/Overview	Students will research labor unions from the early 1900's and create a map to visually represent the number of unions.
Objectives	<ul> <li>Students will locate information in a digital source</li> <li>Students will use the information to plot on a map</li> <li>Students will use the information gained from historic newspapers to write sentence(s)</li> </ul>
Materials	Computer Access to newspapers in collection Digital map of the lower US and Mexico
Key Vocabulary	Union Union president Location Vocation Labor
Lesson	<ol> <li>Ask students the following question: Do you know of any unions that exist in our/your community? Allow students to share responses.</li> <li>Tell students that they will research union locations for their upcoming assignment. Union heavy papers include: Acciòn, Aurora, Avante!, and El Azote. Students can work in pairs or groups. Allow them to look through the papers, and select one they want to work with.</li> <li>Students will then have to read through two to three editions of the paper and answer the following:         <ul> <li>a. Name of Union</li> <li>b. Location</li> <li>c. Name of President (if available)</li> <li>d. Type of work and company</li> </ul> </li> <li>Using a map, students will then pin unions to the map. If you use a learning management system, you could have a class shared map that allows students from multiple groups to post on the same. If using Google Classroom, students can use a Google Sheet to enter information and create a geographical map.
